

Imagine a place. . .


- Committed to nurturing community, comfort, and caring; a place that brings together all the right ingredients to nourish your mind, body and spirit;

A Woman's Place Text Study

Women's voices are often silenced or missing in Jewish texts, or women occupy a space of derision: Sarah "laughed" when she hears she will have a child, Rebecca is deceptive, Rachel steals the household idols, Leah has "weak" eyes. Worse yet, women are raped (Dinah and Tamar), murdered (the *pilegesh* in Judges), offered up for sexual assault (Lot's virgin daughters), and acquired as spoils of war. In order to understand these texts we will reread them through the eyes of women with the insight of feminist scholars who help us to make sense of our present condition and imagine a future in which men and women are partners seeking to achieve the justice our *Torah* espouses.

Our sessions are held on *Rosh Chodesh* (new moon) each month, a time that traditionally has been sacred to women. Each session will include a reading from *Tanakh* and commentary by a feminist scholar. We began with the story of Eve, who in effect, is Everywoman because the negative interpretations of her behavior have impacted all women. Our study has continued, focusing on Hagar, Rahab, Bathsheba, Yael and more.
